While there are many arguments regarding the pros and cons for the assessment at the school level we use the data from the assessment to not only determine the progress and achievement of the students we also analyse the data to determine future planning and direction to ensure improved student outcomes. I have heard many reports from staff regarding the positive attitude students have displayed and how they have been eagerly awaiting the assessment. Our school value of Courage is certainly alive and well. Well done to all students!!

With a number of enrolments in the Kindergarten and PrePrimary classes we were fortunate enough to have Mrs Cimone Van Der Merwe accept an appointment with us we were able to restructure the Kindergarten and Pre-primary classes. Increasing from two classes to three. The students are enjoying the smaller classes and calmer mornings. Many thanks to the parents and carers for their support with these changes and a special mention to the ECE Team who accommodated the increase in student numbers but also ensured the wellbeing and successful transition of the students.

2024 Voluntary Charges and Collections

With the approval of the School Board, Contributions this year have remained the same as previous years—\$65 which comprises \$45 Voluntary Contributions and \$20 P&C Donation. Your students will have received statements for March this week.

These funds, when paid, are classed as Locally Raised Funds and are effectively unbudgeted funds that can be used for expenditure on items that directly benefit our students. The running costs of the school are funded by the Department so any additional funding like this can make a huge difference in what we are able to provide to our school community.

So far this term we have invested almost \$3000 on Origo Maths workbooks which we hope will assist the students and their teachers during their numeracy lessons. This is one of the many items on the "wish list" that we compile with suggestions from staff. Our next intention is to purchase additional benches for the undercover area so that no students are sitting on the ground to eat lunch. These will also provide seating during assemblies.

A massive thankyou to parent/guardians who purchased their 2024 booklists through Office National. Deb Shaw from ONK visited this afternoon to advise that they will be making a donation to us for \$1000 and this figure is based on the number of booklists that they serviced. This is also classed as *Locally Raised Funds* and already Mr Callow has had an amazing idea on how to spend that money! Watch this space.
